North Mundham Parish Council Report

As you can imagine, much of the Council's attention over the past weeks has been focused on responding to the consultation about possible solutions for the A27, and we have been working closely with Chris Page, our District Councillor. The response to our special meeting at the end of

March left no doubt about the overwhelming view of local electors - only the 'Mitigated Northern Route' will provide a satisfactory long-term solution. In our response to consultation we have made it very clear that this is the solution the Parish wishes to see.

As I write this report, it has become clear that the West Sussex County Council is adopting a similar position. The WSCC Environment, Communities and Fire Select Committee met on the afternoon of 4 June to consider how it should advise on the way forward. The briefing papers prepared for the

meeting suggested it should promote the 'Mitigated Northern Route' as a preferred option with the 'Full Southern Route' as a reasonable alternative. But during the meeting it became clear that councillors favoured a more decisive approach, recommending the Northern Route as the Council's single preferred option. By the time you read this report we should know what Chichester District Council has decided. The papers for their meetings on 8 June indicate they plan to promote both routes as equally desirable, without indicating a preference. It remains to be seen whether WSCC's example will persuade them to take a more decisive approach.

WSCC's Cabinet Member confirmed that WSCC would promote the 'Mitigated Northern Route' as a preferred option with the 'Full Southern Route' as a reasonable alternative. At its meeting on 8 June CDC decided, under pressure from councillors, to take the same line.

Celia O'Shea tells the story behind this chocolate mousse recipe.

A friend of mine found it in the filing cabinet of a Harley Street psychiatrist when she was working for him in the 1960s.

It is the best chocolate mousse recipe ever - and one I've been making for over 50 years!

Celia's Chocolate Mousse

6 oz plain chocolate (I prefer Menier but Bourneville is good too)

4 eggs

1/4 pt double cream

1 tbsp black coffee

1 tbsp brandy



- Melt chocolate in double boiler pan, stir in coffee, allow to cool slightly
- 2. Add brandy
- 3. Beat in egg yolks gradually
- 4. Whip cream, whisk in to chocolate mixture
- 5. Whisk egg whites, FOLD into mixture with a fork

(I sometimes add some chopped nuts, folded in at the end).

Celia's Chocolate Cake

My chocolate cake recipe came from a friend - it's dead easy and virtually fool-proof and a favourite with my family.

7 ½ oz plain flour

8 ½ oz. caster sugar

1 ½ oz. cocoa

5 oz. margarine (soft)

8 oz milk

1 1/4 level teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

1.4 level teaspoon cream of tartar


1 level teaspoon vanilla essence

2 eggs

- Sift dry ingredients. Add margarine, milk and vanilla.
- 2. Mix until smooth.
- 3. Add eggs and beat for 1 minute only
- 4. Pour into 2 7" sandwich tins. Cook for approx. 30 mins at 180 C (350F, gas4)

To make frosting (it thickens as it cools)
Dissolve (heat in microwave but take care not to boil):
2 this water; 2 oz caster sugar and 1 oz butter, then beat into 4 oz. icing sugar and 1 oz cocoa
