Parish Council: Chairmans Report

You may have seen in the national or local press that the Government has a number of proposals to change the planning system. There are actually two sets of proposals. One is a set of detailed changes to the existing planning regime, most notably a change to the way the housing requirement for each District is calculated. If it is enacted, this change would require a big increase in the number of houses for which Chichester's Local Plan would have to find space. I understand that both West Sussex County Council and Chichester District Council will make a critical response to these proposals, and your Parish Council is also preparing a response which argues against them.

In the slightly longer term, the Government has published a White Paper which proposes a much more radical change to the national planning system, and local government bodies have until the end of October to respond. Much closer to home, I am happy to report that we have been successful in an application for funding for some outdoor gym equipment, and the Playing Fields Trust has offered to provide some additional funding. We will be discussing with the Trust exactly where on the playing fields the apparatus will be sited, to provide an accessible keep fit opportunity for local residents.

Now that autumn is with us, there is some more work to do on the old canal and at Camic Pond, under the supervision of the Manhood Wildlife and Heritage Group whose help has been so valuable. We plan to hold regular working parties which are currently scheduled for the first Thursday of each month, starting on 1 October. If you would like to join us please let me know, and I will make sure you get an invitation with the details. The working groups will be arranged to comply with the 'Rule of Six' social distancing requirements. No special skills are required, and we can find something for almost anyone to do. It may be that Thursdays do not suit everyone, and if there are sufficient volunteers we will try to arrange sessions at other times – please let me know

Finally, a number of people have drawn my attention to the very aggressive clearance which has started in the field between Canal Mead and Post Office Lane. This is a fast-moving situation which we are watching closely, and the District Council's Planning Enforcement team are already aware. However, we will not be able to act unless there is an identified breach of planning legislation.

Readers Letter, Wildlife Destruction in N. Mundham. Name and Address Supplied.

"Since Tuesday 22nd September 2020 there have been large scale foliage excavations in the field behind Canal Mead leading through to an access in Post Office Lane beside the Foot Path to Runcton. As residents of Canal Mead we were blissfully unaware of any works that were due to commence and after speaking to the company operating the machinery we were still none the wiser.

On Wednesday evening we were approached by a gentleman who informed us he had purchased the field and was clearing it for horses. This field was taken over some years ago for horses and now the owner of the horses has bought the field. It is not necessary to destroy the natural wildlife boundary of the fields to accommodate horses. A vast number of trees, bushes and hedgerows have been destroyed and along with them, homes for a huge number of wildlife from birds, bats, foxes, to deer and rabbits. We were devastated and have not seen birds in our garden for 3 days which is highly unusual when we were visited daily by a wide range of beautiful breeds. A large 6 metre gap has been left beside the loggers' yard off Canal Mead leaving the properties vulnerable and open from a security perspective. Residents in Canal Mead who back onto the field have been informed by the 'owner' that the fence which runs along the back of their properties will be removed and taken back to the fence line which runs on their boundary. This will eradicate the 2-metre gap they currently have where trees have been planted by The Hyde Housing Group and puts the field's boundary right up to the back of their gardens. This is a matter of considerable concern as the residence of Canal Mead do not know what the future possible planning could be and what development could take place with buildings right up against their back gardens.

It would seem the field was purchased on Tuesday 22nd September and the machinery moved in and started work the same day to get as much destruction done before anyone had a chance to dispute it. Such wilful destruction to the open spaces in our village for profit is devastating to all of us who live here. "Please see **photos hereunder.**



Editors comment regarding the readers letter above.

The letter is from residents who live on the boundaries of a lovely open space, a space where wildlife and birds thrive. This field has just been sold and the destruction was immediate. Too often these days our open spaces that make our villages a pleasant place to live are being destroyed in the interest of profit. No time was wasted in the destruction as you will see in the story below from one of the residents who valued and encouraged the wildlife around them. Follow this story and keep an eye on this field and watch how over a short space of time it will be cleared and then sold for development, more houses will be built on it. In the meantime, caravans and large vehicles will probably park themselves there destroying the natural beauty of the open space right in the centre of our village.

Poppy Appeal



Local Walk- A Short Autumn Stroll Round East Head.

With the summer rush to the beach gradually easing, October is a great time to try this 3.5 mile weekday dog-friendly walk starting from West Wittering Beach car park and taking in the sandy beach up to and around East Head; popular for dinghy sailing and wildlife, with lovely views across Chichester channel to the Isle of Wight, Birdham and Hayling Island. Also popular with wind and kite surfers.

NB Due to the fine sand and exposed location, very windy days can be a challenge.

Car parking in October is £5: 8am-6pm pre-bookable online only via JustPark. The No 52 bus from Chichester takes 26mins and drops off near The Landing café (see map).



Route Summary.

Starting at the beach car park and following the red track, East Head is entered by 'The Hinge' (see map) and is managed by the National Trust as a rare coastal and wildlife location, so please keep dogs on a lead whilst in the dunes.

Because of changing tides, please stay on the clear paths and DO NOT STRAY onto the sandbars.

There are optional refreshment and loo stops on the beach front near the parking or at The Landing Café near Roman Landing. At present these all offer 'Take-Away' service only.

COVID-19 measures on the beach are detailed here.

NB There is an extension to the walk using The Lipchiss Way - See the map and the NT <u>website</u> but beware! this section can be <u>extremely</u> muddy after heavy rain.



The 'gpx' track can be downloaded from Viewranger as 'West Wittering: East Head Walk'. Ordnance Survey maps are Landranger 197 or Explorer 120. Wittering Beach Car Park is at Grid Reference: SZ770980.

Looking After Your Lawn.

A New Article From Our On-Board Gardener Mathew Wiggs To Give You All Month By Month Advice On Your Gardens Throughout The Year.

Now October has arrived, we will see cooler and shorter days this month. This means there is not much to do in the ornamental garden, however it is also very important to make the most of the warmth whilst it lasts and there is still a wide range of jobs to get done. For example, it is important to look after your lawn in October and restore it after the dry summer weather and make sure it survives through the winter.

These jobs include:

Creating a new lawn from turf or seed – this is because the autumn weather is favourable for good lawn establishment

Make the height of your mower blades rise this is because the growth of the grass will slow down. So make sure to raise your mowing heights by one to two settings until spring next year.

Carry through crucial lawn maintenance - this must be done so that waterlogging and compaction can be avoided. As well as making sure to aerate your lawn with a garden fork, this will help remove thatch from the surface with a rake, meaning dead patches can be repaired. In addition to this, remember if you have a large area to cover, try and use a specialist lawn scarifier.

Cover your lawn with a special lawn top-dressing — once you have finished your maintenance work. Make sure to read and follow the instructions on the packet carefully. This will not only improve the look of your grass but it will also help benefit the health of the grass too.

Use an autumn fertiliser to feed your lawn – October is the best time to do this because the morning dew creates moisture to help absorb the fertilizer. This gives the grass time to build stamina to prepare for a cold winter. Also supporting the root growth of your grass will lead to a greener and healthier lawn in spring.

Control lawn chafers (chafer grubs/beetles) – make sure to do this with a biological control (nematodes). It is important to control these beetles as they will lay eggs, which will turn into grubs and these grubs will feed off the roots in your grass. Therefore to save your grass, chafer grubs much be controlled.

Water the lawn – however this is unlikely, unless you have little soil moisture and are planning lawn renovations such as seeding, scarifying, or aeration. But if you do so, make sure to water the lawn in the morning to reduce the risk of disease.

Travelogue: Rye Smiles.

Earlier in September we were, with some French friends, hoping to repair The Entente Cordiale by sharing a small house at Rye Harbour for a week, but COVID-



19 rules put paid to that! So View from Rye to Rye Harbour

we went on our own and are rather glad that we did. Rye in East Sussex, on the confluence of the Rother, Brede and Tillingham rivers, has an noteworthy history for such a small town and was in French ownership till 1247 having been given to the Normans by King Ethelred The III Advised.

Rye Harbour is inappropriately named being two miles from Rye and there has been a harbour at Rye (The

Strand) since the time of the Cinq Ports when Rye provided ships to defend England against continental invasion.

So what appealed to us about Rye Harbour? The one word answer; 'Shingle'. You may think you're qualified to talk

about shingle, living close to Pagham and Selsey. Well, Rye Harbour and Dungeness Spit nearby have World-Class quantities. Where did it come from and why is it so appealing I don't hear you ask?

Here again, there is, 'literally' a French Connection. Around 8000 years ago in a tsunami event known geologically as Brexit 1.0, the land bridge from Europe to Our Island was ruptured and massive amounts of flint were released into the English Channel. Over time, due to wave, wind and storm action they have

accumulated as shingle on the coast. With World-Class shingle comes World-Class wildlife. Being so close to France it is no surprise that immigrants regularly attempt the perilous journey across the Channel and arrive here on our shores unannounced. One such immigrant is the Clouded Yellow butterfly which

we saw near Camber Castle, indeed a pair of them, disporting in the long grass and likely doing what continentals are known for.

Nearby, having spent the summer in the UK and now travelling in the other direction, a flock of expatriate Yellow Wagtails, was, no doubt, ready to consume any amount of Clouded Yellows to _ fuel their flight to the continent.



RECIPE: Memories of Summer.

CHICKEN MARBELLA Serves 4-6 people.

Can be marinated for up to 2 days in the fridge or cooked straight away if you don't have the time. If so, season with the salt and pepper by rubbing it in thoroughly before combining



with the rest of the marinade ingredients, then bake.

You can use chicken supreme on the bone rather than legs.

Ingredients

8 chicken legs (2 kg) drumstick and thigh attached, skin on and scored 3 or 4 times to the bone.

5 cloves garlic, crushed

3 tbs olive oil

100g pitted green olives

60g capers + 2 tbs of their juices

120g. Medjool dates, pitted and quartered lengthways

2 bay leaves

120ml dry white wine

1 tbsp date molasses (or treacle) – though the molasses has a lovely zing to it that treacle doesn't.

Salt and black pepper to taste.

Method

Place the chicken and all the dry ingredients (bar molasses and wine) into a large plastic bag and shake it about so that the meat is completely coated. Marinate in fridge, covered for 1-2 days stirring a few times.

Preheat oven to 180 C fan.

Spread chicken out on a high sided medium baking tray along with the marinade. Whisk the wine and molasses together and pour over. Cook for 50 minutes basting 2 or 3 times till golden brown on top and cooked through. Scatter with oregano and serve.

BAKED RICE WITH CONFIT TOMATOES AND GARLIC To accompany Chicken Marbella

Ingredients

800g cherry tomatoes

12 large garlic cloves or 25 regular, peeled (85g) 4 banana shallots peeled and cut into 3cm pieces (220a)

25g coriander cut into 4cm lengths plus 10g leaves roughly chopped to garnish

3 tbsp picked thyme leaves (10)

4 small cinnamon sticks

100ml olive oil

300g basmati rice

600ml boiling water

Salt and pepper to taste


Method

Preheat oven to 160C fan

Arrange tomatoes, garlic, shallots, herbs and cinnamon sticks in a large high sided casserole dish ($20 \times 30 \text{ cm}$ approx.) Pour over olive oil ½ tsp salt and a good grind of black pepper. Place in oven for 1 hour till the vegetables are soft. Remove from oven, sprinkle the rice evenly over vegetables without stirring them together and set aside.

Increase oven to 220C fan

Sprinkle ½ teaspoon salt and ground black pepper over the rice, carefully pour the boiling water over. Seal tightly with foil and place in the oven for 25 minutes. Remove, set aside for 10 minutes still covered. Remove foil, sprinkle over the coriander leaves, stir gently into the rice and serve.


